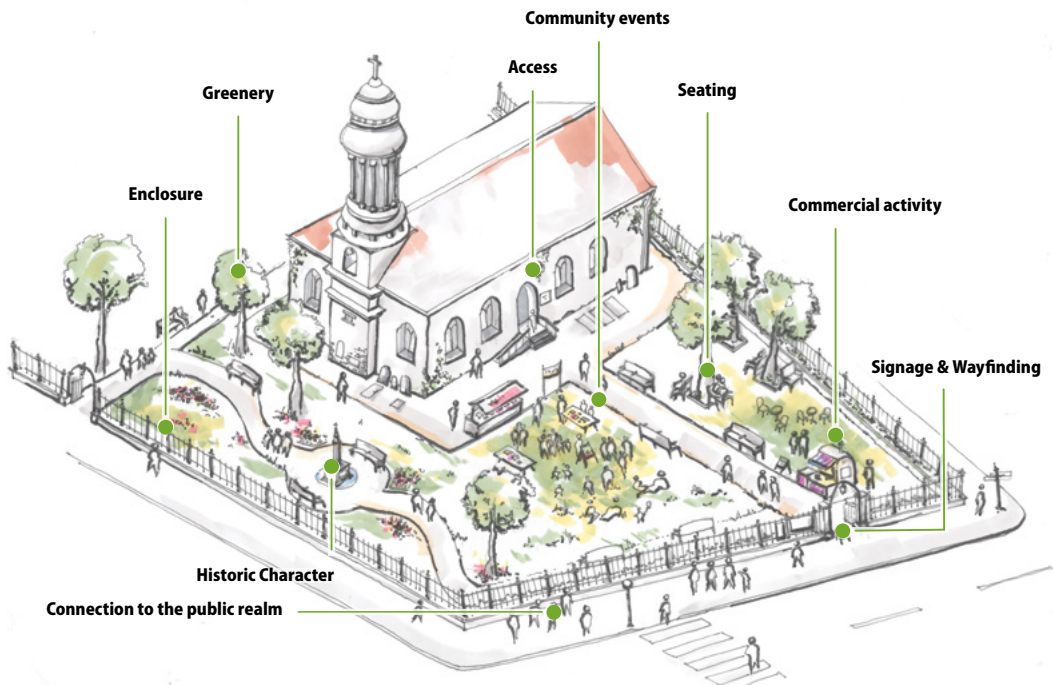

The City's Churchyards

Nowhere else in Britain is there so concentrated a group of former burial grounds within a tightly proscribed urban area. As a group of heritage assets, the City's churches and churchyards are a unique group of interlinked buildings and spaces. They vary in size, arrangement and atmosphere; individually and collectively they make a valuable contribution to City amenity, well-being and sense of place. They form the setting in which to appreciate numerous churches and monuments and provide green, tranquil havens amidst high volumes of commercial activity.

Churchyards Enhancement Programme

The City of London Corporation is working in partnership with the Diocese of London and St Paul's Cathedral to develop a programme of enhancement projects for the City's Churchyards which aims to:

- Provide high quality, inspiring and sustainable spaces
- Ensure safe and inclusive places for all the City's communities
- Respond to the projected increase in worker, visitor and resident numbers in the City by providing enhanced areas to sit, eat lunch, play or relax, including accommodating 'agile working'
- Prioritise the enhancement of those churchyards in most need

Funding and Consents

The City proposes to use some of its Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) neighbourhood pot to deliver the churchyard enhancements as well as securing additional funds from other sources and bids. CIL is a statutory charge applied to new development to help fund the infrastructure needed to support planned development in an area. Infrastructure to be funded by the City CIL in accordance with the 2014 Regulation 123 List includes: Publicly accessible open space, sports and recreation facilities and public realm enhancement. Any alterations, including change of use, would be subject to the relevant consents including planning permission and the church faculty procedure.

The Churchyards Programme has identified four 'themes'. Together these aim to capture the characteristics of an ideal churchyard:

Character

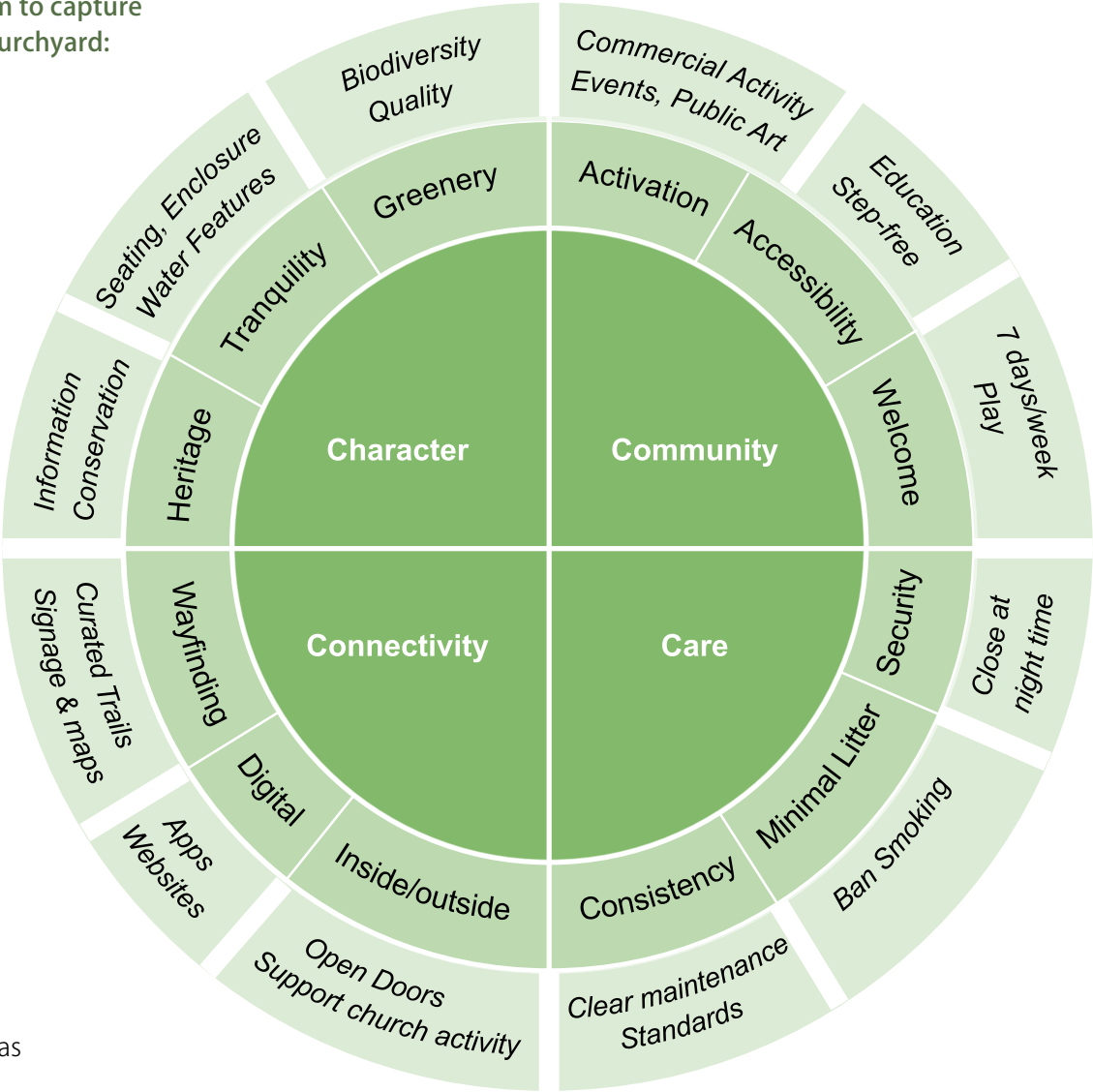
The unique quality of these historic, green and tranquil spaces is conserved and enhanced

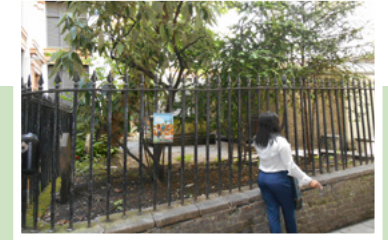
